### **Objectives/Description**

### NIMS - IS-300: Intermediate ICS for expanding incidents for first responders

The NIC recommends that all mid-level management personnel should take ICS-300. The course material is specific to personnel who will be serving in the following positions: command staff, section chiefs, strike team leaders, task force leaders, unit leaders, division/group supervisors, branch directors, and multi-agency coordination system/emergency operations center staff.

#### **Rationale for completion of ICS Training**

National Incident Management System training is one of the important elements that state, territorial, tribal and local entities must complete to become fully compliant with NIMS from FEMA and Homeland Security. Jurisdictions are required to meet the FY07 NIMS requirements as a condition of receiving federal preparedness funding assistance. ICS-300 and ICS-400 training will continue to be an essential NIMS training requirement in future years. During the conduct of this training, students move away from awareness training (IS-700, IS-800, ICS-100, and ICS-200) to practical application of ICS (i.e. development of an incident action plan, establishing a command structure based on a scenario, etc.). The next step in the training process will be for students to develop core competencies by completing ICS position specific training.

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
